YouTube videos are a great guide but decide for yourself that you can tow without killing your truck.

Step Four: Plan Your Routes and Stops: Before hitting the road, plan your routes and stops. Use apps and websites to find RV-friendly campgrounds, rest areas, and fuel stations. This will save you time and reduce stress during your travels.
